

Premier's Reading Challenge

Tips for classroom teachers assisting with the Challenge

Term 1 – prior to Challenge opening

- Familiarise yourself with information on the [PRC website](#).
- Visit and bookmark the [Premier's Reading Challenge support website](#). It allows you to search for information about the PRC, instructions on using the PRC website and how to contact the PRC team.
- Provide the following information to parents and carers:
 - Student login details
 - Challenge [opening and closing](#) dates.
 - How to log onto the website and add books to a [Student Reading Record \(SRR\)](#).
 - A copy of [Tips for Parents and Carers](#) (from the PRC website).
- Ask your school PRC coordinator / teacher librarian to search the PRC Booklists for themes to support your classwork.
- Set reminders for the Challenge [opening and closing](#) dates in your calendar and to your class's online learning/communication platform.
- For younger public students and all non-government students: keep a record of your students' usernames and passwords.

Note: Students are unable to log onto the PRC website until the Challenge opens.

Term 1 – Challenge open

- Ask one student to log on to the Student Experience site to demonstrate how to add books to a student's reading record (SRR), or use the PowerPoint presentation resources the [Tips and Teaching notes page](#). There is also a [video on the support site](#) that can be shown to students that shows them how to login to the Student Experience site, search for books, and add books to their SRR.
- Ask older students to set reminders in their calendars/diaries about logging their books in the [PRC Student experience site](#).
- Notify your PRC coordinator of any students who require their [Challenge level adjusted to the 3-10 Challenge](#).

K-2 teachers:

- Keep a record of all books you read to your class, or
- Log on as one student and record books read to your class on that student's SRR. When 30 books are recorded, let the PRC coordinators know the [SRR can be copied to the whole class](#).
- Notify your PRC coordinators about independent readers who could [attempt the 3-4 Challenge](#).

Term 2

- Include regular PRC reminders in your class term letter/learning site/homework sheets
- Display a selection of PRC books, including ['easy reads'](#) in your classroom for silent or buddy reading.
- Check that any new students have a working logon for the PRC website, and know how to log books on their SRR.
- Celebrate students who have already finished the Challenge by displaying their names your classroom. Use the Canva [template](#) provided by the PRC or create your own.

Term 3 – prior to Challenge closing

- Continue celebrating students who have already finished the Challenge by displaying their names in the library or their classrooms. Use the Canva [template](#) provided by the PRC or create your own.
- **K-2 teachers** – Check you have added 30 books read to the whole class to one student's SRR. Let the PRC coordinators know the [SRR can be copied to the whole class](#) well before the Challenge close date.
- **Teachers of Year 3 and up** – ask the PRC coordinator to provide you with the '[not validated](#)' and '[validated](#)' reports for your grade. Encourage any students who are close to completion to complete and record their reading before the Challenge closes.
- Remind students and parents/carers of the [Challenge closing date](#).

Term 3 – Challenge closed to students

- Ask the PRC coordinators to generate an SRR count report for your grade. Only students on this report are eligible for a certificate – check all names appear and are spelt correctly.
 - Notify your PRC coordinators of any issues with students names and if necessary, request administrative staff [amend any student details](#) in the 'Preferred Name' fields in ERN.
 - Take note of which students are eligible for Gold (SRR count of 4) and Platinum (SRR count of 7) certificates.

Note: Coordinators can continue to add to students' reading records and validate their SRRs until the Coordinator deadline, which is two weeks after the student deadline.

Term 4

- Encourage your students to continue to read towards the 2024 NSW Premier's Reading Challenge.
